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What We Looked at in This Study?

- What are the care needs of Moroccan caregivers raising a child with autism?
- Which services or interventions did they receive?
- Where there any differences in needs and service use between caregivers living in urban and rural areas in Morocco?

Why This Study Matters?

Understanding caregivers' needs will help inform healthcare policymakers, develop or improve services, and empower caregivers.

Our Approach: How We Conducted the Study


We interviewed parents of children with autism in urban and rural areas. ^{1,2}



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2 the Caregiver Needs Survey was used, developed by Autism Speaks (Daniels et al., 2017).

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Key Discoveries



Caregivers often had to travel long distances to receive diagnostic services, especially those from rural areas.





76% of the caregivers reported financial problems due to caring for their autistic child.



Many caregivers experienced stigma or feelings of helplessness.

Education



Approximately a quarter of all the children were not enrolled in school:



Care

These were the interventions children most often received:

- Speech / language therapy
- ABA
 - Social skills training
 - Psycho-motor therapy
 - Sensory integration therapy
 - Cognitive therapy
 - Occupational therapy

BUT: a significant proportion of children never received any intervention:



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Top challenges to caring for a child with autism



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What did we Learn?

- Children from urban areas were much more likely to receive intervention and attend school than children from rural areas.
- Caregivers expressed similar needs for improved care and education.
- Caregivers from rural areas reported more challenges with their children's autonomy skills, such as eating and toilet training.
- Caregivers from urban areas reported more challenges with their children's social-communicational skills.

What are the Implications of our Results?



These differences may inform healthcare policy-makers and program developers.

Adaptive interventions are important to respond to regional needs.



Challenges in caring such as costs, barriers in access to education, care and information, or stigma, should be addressed.
